


ABOUT PLAN INDIA

Plan India work with its NGO and o mmunity partners to protet b ildren from all forms of abue and exploitation, thus helping b ildren realie their dreams and full potential





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
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



It gives me immense please re to be are Plan India's 2015-16 Annual Report with vp u. During the vp ar, Plan India's programmes have reabled over a million be ildren in more than 2,500 in llages and 450 urban be ums through 193 projects across 14 to ates

Some of our & y ab ieve ments over the last very ar, in Plan's programme of mmunities as highlighted by external evaluations inbude the following:

- More than 18,500 into itutional deliver ries were faic litated by Plan and its partners
- 62,000 children in six Plan intervention states benefitted from the o ns rut ion and renow tion of 200 water points providing ae s to a fe drinking water
- Or r 400,000 b ildren s udy ng in 2,660 primary, s o ndary and senior secondary schools benefitted as a result of our edua tional intere ntions
- Over 60,000 women were supported by microfinance at iv ties through 2,800 groups at os the o untry

Plan India s e s ully rolled out Projet Ahana to implement e rvie s for the Prevention of Parent to Child Transm is on (PPTCT) of HIV in 9 s ates and 218 districts of India. The projet aims to tes 1.78 c ore pregnant women for HIV and provide ae s to early infant diagnos is to at leas 90% of HIV ex os d infants

Plan India responded to the floods in Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana as well as the drought is tuation in Maharab tra, Jharkhand and Uttar Pradesh, with this year being the first time that in addition to food bake ts and hygiene k ts provision of water through tankers was made for o mmunities in Beed

dis ric in Maharas tra. Or rall, our humanitarian as its ane and long term rehabilitation reab ed more than 56,000 b ildren, women and men in the wors affect ed areas during thes dis ters Furthermore, this ar mark the o mpletion of the Hudhud Rep one programme while has benefitted nearly 4,000 families which were worst affect ed by the sone in o at al Andhra Prades to rebuild their lie lihoods

As part of Plan India's adv a v efforts I am proud to share that Plan India, in partners ip with Cons rtium for Street Children (CSC), hos ed a South As an onferene, in April 2016, on bildren in seret stuations and ontributed to the United Nation's forthoming General Comment.

In the lead up to a first ever of its kind national conference on Children in Difficult Circumstances (CIDC), Plan India organised five regional o nferene s and 30 s ate o ns Itations with the objet is of es ablis ing a platform to fos er dialogue and promote o llaboration to addres the rights of the mos u Inerable b ildren.

As part of Plan India's Country Strategic Plan, by 2020, Plan India is o mmitted to improving the lives of five million children and youth, through adva a v and work ng bos ly with the Government and other partners to ensire that no b ild is left behind.

We, at Plan India, firmly believe that in addition to basic rights of health, nutrition and eduation, be ildren must also be given the opportunity to enhane their cleative a pabilities and participate in decisions affecting their lives. India being home to the larges number of b ildren in the world, providing them ae s to quality healthcare, education and nutrition is a significant b allenge to equitable growth. Ac os India, the number of girls and boy enrolled and regularly attending **b** ools has improve d to around 95%, hower, nearly 6 million b ildren are to ill out of **b** ool and many more are either dropping out or irregular to b ool. Ree nt data india tes a drop in b ild marriage in girls from 47.4% (2005-06) to 30.3% (2013-14) but the ow rall to atus of girls in India has not been mub to e lebrate. Similarly, child trafficking and child labour continue to be major b allenges facing b ildren in u Inerable is tuations with nearly 30 million b ildren engaged in one or the other form of labour, either in their family enterprie s or outs de.

During FY' 16, the Government of India ub ered greater devo lution of reponsibilities to State Governments for ocial ect or programming with an objective to ae lerate the implementation of welfare s hemes and programmes See ral government flagship programmes - such as 'Beti Bab ao Beti Padhao', 'Swab h Bharat Abhia n', Digital India, Sk Ils India, Sb ool WASH Improvements Integrated Child Deve Iopment Serive s (ICDS), Integrated Child Protet ion Sb eme, Midday Meals - are directly aligned with Plan India's Country Strategic Plan (CSP) IV objet in s

Plan India's programme model involves working in partners ip with gras root NGOs government offices and technical agencies to implement the programmes aligned with the CSP IV (2015-20). Furthermore, Plan India is deve loping innova tive pilots to influence public policy and improve o mmunity governane. These programmes have been implemented ac os 14 s ates that Plan India works in and benefit children, youth and their families in o mmunities with low der lopment india tors

Through 16 field Programme Units, Plan India was able to reab nearly 2,500 i llages and 450 urban slums, directly benefitting more than 1 million b ildren, of whib, more than half were girls. During the ge ar, a pecal emphass was given to the prevention of child labour and trafficking, gender dis imination, adoles nt health, universal birth o ntrol and b ild nutrition. Additionally, over two million children have been positively influenced through our a rious programmes and a mpaign initiative s with a pport from 27 long term NGO partners and 60 theme p ecalis NGOs

They are now so ported to take the b ild deve lopment agenda forward in their communities.

During the sear, we maintained so ecal foors on promoting Village Water Safety and Seority as part of our WASH interentions. See ral ivillages in remote and hard to real loations were supported through participatory teb niques and government linkages, to are supported through participatory teb niques and government linkages, to are supported through participatory teb niques and governmental hygiene and learn good practices on environmental hygiene and ommunity anitation. The programme resulted in 111,500 house holds haiving are so to be an and a fedrinking water. Additionally, over 24,000 persons were trained on water management and 84,500 so ool bildren and so uth were oriented on ommunity and personal hygiene.

In an effort to promote quality and holis ic edua tion, over 15,000 re-enrolled b ildren

o mpleted Clas X and 50,000 b ildren now have ae s to functional libraries and is ene labs in their b ools Innovative projects like Digital Learning Centres are making it easier for young girls to gain ae s to quality eduation using digital teb nology. At another level, the digital learning programme has enabled teab ers to improve their pedagogic kells and raise quality of bas oom trans to ions

Emphais was also given to employability and eo nomic empowerment programmes especially in providing young girls and women with the tools necessary to become financially independent. As a result of sub programmes 38,500 women gained access to financial services. Child protet ion being at the heart of all of Plan India's b ild development at iv ties we ensured that 250,000 b ildren in vulnerable is tuations directly benefitted through our child protection interventions. They have, in turn, supported nearly 80,000 bildren.





A positive ray of hope

Anuradha and her hub and were thrilled to son be parents for the first time. When Anuradha went into labour, be was taken to the hop ital and underwent routine media. I test the Her reports a me as a blow — be was HIV positive and o mplia tions required that be have a C-set ion.

That night, is e delive red a baby boy. The iv llage Ac edited Soic al Health Ac iiv is brought along an outreab worker from Plan India's Project Ahana who promptly gave him a doe of Neivrapine to prevent HIV transn is on. Anuradha grew weaker and was referred to a medial ollege, her hub and advised to return home. Both were diagnosed HIV positive by confirmatory tests and immediately linked to Antiretroivral Therapy (ART).

People in their iv llage got to ke ow and threatened to throw them out for fear of infet ion. Beleaguered and ostrate of in the ommunity, Anuradha's father-in-law ommitted of it do. When word reab ed the projet team, a meeting was held with over 60 village leaders to raise awarenes and dip el my has about HIV. Realising their mitake, the ommunity apologied and wellomed the family bake. Today, Anuradha and her family are on their way to be oming healthy again. They regularly meet with the Plan India projet team, take ART and immunise their son, fittingly named Armaan (hope).

Key Activities

In partners ip with Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tubera loss and Malaria and the National AIDS Control Organia tion (NACO), Projet Ahana was implemented with an aim to make a significant impact in the global fight agains HIV and AIDS by ae lerating the uptake of PPTCT serves amongs women and bildren in the most marginalis do mmunities of India. The projet or serves at 218 districts ac os 9 states

Along with our loa I NGO partners World Breastfeeding Week (Aug 1-7) was obe red by numerous o mmunities we work in. Mass awarenes a mps with mothers on b ild malnutrition were organied with over 25,000 mothers and o mmunity members in attendane. Loa I government health workers were also invited to be are their knowledge.

In Delhi, an orientation for fathers from our o mmunities was organie d on b ild rearing and family planning methods. The purpose was to enhane their knowledge on newborn health and nutrition. Seis ons were led by experts in the field who poke on the lates developments in family planning, inbuding oral pills o ndoms (male and female), emergency o ntrae ption, etc.

Making Learning Fun and safe

The Senpur Primary Sb ool in Ambedlar Nagar district, Uttar Pradesh, has 63 st udents and four teab ers. It lake d all the basic faic lities that make learning and teab ing fun and a fe.

Girls es ec ally, did not regularly attend cas due to poor hy iene o nditions. Wore to ill, open defeation was practiced around the sool. The shool and to udents had all but given up hope, that is until a vist by Plan India's to aff to anged things for the better.

As part of the Support My Sb ool a mpaign implemented by Plan India and a pported by Coa -Cola and NDTV, a parate toilets were built, a fe drink ng water was made an ilable and p orts fac lities were also provided.

Sine then, the number of b ildren enrolled in Clas I has inc eae d and retention has gone up from 51% to 80%. Mos importantly, the b ildren now look forward to o ming to b ool to b udy and play with their friends

Our work on WASH aims to ens re that be ildren and o mmunities have are so to be ean water and a nitary facilities. Working with be ools our programmes engage with the udents informing them about personal happine. Our work also enompasses building and renovation of toilets in be ools and o mmunities with the purpose of ending the pratie of open defeation.

By providing ae s to WASH e rivices b ildren and youth from wo Inerable and ek uded o mmunities and urban bound are able to lead a healthier lifes by e and attend be ool regularly.

th aniv awoke in a hop ital no longer able to read or write. The preivous exe ning, to e had aic dentally fallen off the roof of her home in Delhi, so ffering a traumatic brain injury that forework r b anged her life.

As a former **b** ool topper, **b** e was heartbrok n. She took to **b** ay ng home and helping her mother with **b** ores refusing to go to **b** ool for fear that **b** e'd dia ppoint here If and her teab ers Then one day, a **y** ung woman **b** opped by to **p** eak with **b** aniv and her family.

She was a learning faic litator at a nearby Digital Learning Centre s pported by Plan India and Ericss n. It took a bit of o niv nic ng, but Jhanvi finally decided to start studying there.

Now, blaniv is bowly going bak to her old e If. She attends bas regularly, is the first to share her thoughts and encourages er by ody to o me to the entre and learn. More importantly, be has learned to read and write again. She plans to be a be ool teabler when be e grows up.

GOAL 2020

Improve holits ic learning and quality eduation (pre-primary to e o ndary eduation) in 3,000 ECCD/Anganwadi Centres and 3,000 b ools

Our edua tional programme is based on the knowledge that learning begins at birth, and early formative spars play a cuical role in the development of a bild. We fost er innovative and incuisive teab ing and learning so that marginalised and at-rike bildren and sputh learn in a sefe environment.

Through bildren's bubs mediabubs anganwadi entres etc bildren are provided with an eduation, health and nutritional benefits and a safe and conducive environment to learn and grow in. They are also provided through mains reaming and re-enrolment in sools to omplete their eduation.

Mahima was the o le breadwinner for a family of four. Her job as a daily wage work r was all the more unbearable bea up on o me day b e earned Rs. 75, on others nothing.

It was during these triying times that Mahima heard about Projet Samanta, a prorted by the European Union, to take eithe is e of wage dip arity and dis imination in the work plae. She so on joined the women's olletime where is e poke of her problems and realise dis ewas 't the only one.

Along with the rest of the women, Mahima now had a platform to vote her one rns and on front her emplover. She took up the ist ewith Community based Vigilane Groups - a part of Projet Samanta.

A member of the department ao mpanied the group and o une lled the employ r on work lae laws equal remuneration and the Minimum Wage, At. After e ral s b meetings, finally, the employer agreed to pay equal wage and Mahima and the other women began ree iv ng the a me wages as the men. Their work hours were a t down and they were er n afforded break in between.

It a me to Kiran's attention during one s b meeting that a 16 s ar old girl was forcibly take n out of s hool by her parents and was being married off agains her will. Together, the girls approab ed the Blok. Des lopment Officer. Their tenacity moved him to take immediate at ion and s op the wedding.

This ree nated with the entire is llage, and a lminated in an announe ment being made by the elders no underage girl in their o mmunity would exer be fore d to marry again.



Thrisha was finally ready to go back to school. She had found her motivation to ontinue with her studies. Today, so e is bake to being the enthus as ic young student so e was before the floods hit and is performing extremely well in bas


